





Personal data

- **❖ Personal data** are information relating to an identified or identifiable natural person.
- Name (together with:)
- · Cell phone number
- Address
- Sexual preferences
- · Political beliefs...



Sensitive data

❖Sensitive data are data revealing racial or ethnic origin, political opinions, religious or philosophical beliefs, tradeunion membership, and the processing of data concerning health or sex life



Data controller

Controller shall mean the natural or legal person, public authority, agency or any other body which alone or jointly with others determines the purposes and means of the processing of personal data.



Data controllers in SNS

SNS providers:

- ✓ They provide means for the processing of user data
- ✓They provide all the basic services related to user management
- ✓ They determine the use of the collected data

They are considered as "data subjects"

Household exemption

Article 3 Scope

- 1. This Directive shall apply to the processing of personal data wholly or partly by automatic means, and to the processing otherwise than by automatic means of personal data which form part of a filing system or are intended to form part of a filing system.
- 2. This Directive shall not apply to the processing of personal data:
- in the course of an activity which falls outside the scope of Community law, such as those provided for by Titles V and VI of the Treaty on European Union and in any case ...by a natural person in the course of a **purely personal** or **household** (incl activity
- to State security matters) and the activities of the State in areas of criminal law,
- by a natural person in the course of a purely personal or household activity.

Purpose for the processing of the data needs to be defined and consent needs to be acquired!




When?
